- **NAD**Education is the official online presence of the *North American Division Office of Education*. This Website communicates guiding philosophy, administrative policy, NAD-required K-12 curriculum, marketing resources, school contact information and Websites, and links to additional services it sponsors or recommends. J2E, CIRCLE and TDEC are Websites sponsored by the NAD Office of Education, for specific services. <http://nadeducation.org>
- **CIRCLE**, acronym for the *Adventist Curriculum and Instruction Resource Center Linking Educators*, serves as a clearinghouse for Adventist education. CIRCLE's priority is to seek out and connect uniquely Adventist-designed curriculum, instruction and education administration resources K-20. <http://circle.adventist.org>
- **J2E**, acronym for *Journey to Excellence*, is the guiding framework for Adventist education in North America. The J2E Website provides an overview of the purposes and preferred practices built on ten goals. Use this site to align school plans and curriculum development as one might adjust one's journey after consulting a compass, to ensure the desired destination is reached. Teaching *The Levees*

Katrina's floodwaters may have receded, but the cultural, social, and political damage remains -- and needs to be explored. This curriculum package, designed to accompany Spike Lee's powerful documentary *When the Levees Broke: A Requiem in Four Acts*, will carry the cultural debris of Hurricane Katrina into the classroom. A media-literacy component teaches students how to steady themselves against media spins and biases, and helps them examine the failure of government officials to act decisively in Katrina's wake. The ambitious package, supported by the Rockefeller Foundation, aims to rekindle the fading questions the survivors and victims of Katrina have left for us -- namely, "What kind of country are we?" and "What kind of country do we hope to be?"

This is the extension of the YouTube model to YouTheTeacherTube. This site, unaffiliated with the online video-sharing powerhouse, is a Web bazaar for teachers to browse and post professional-development videos. Viewers can learn everything from how to teach electromagnetism to the best tips for creating an in-class laser show to the mathematics of musical-instrument strings.

As a rule, we discourage pictures of individual students on a Web site, pictures such as a student directory or class pictures, but to use activity shots of students at play or in the classroom doing an activity, or a mission/outreach project are fine. Just remember that there are predators out there searching for young girls and boys to destroy. If they can use your Web site to identify those children, fixate on them, find your school using the address on your site and then prey upon them, then don't use the picture. Never give





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student names associated with the pictures as that is one more piece they can use to track that child. You can say the seventh graders, or the drama team, but try not to use individual names. Sometimes it is unavoidable, but always be sure that the parents sign off on placing the name on the Web.
